The Honourable Robert Borbidge AO

The Honourable Robert Borbidge AO was the 35th Premier of Queensland and served in the State Parliament for just over 20 years. During this time he held a number of senior positions including senior Ministries, Deputy Leader of the Opposition, Leader of the Opposition and Premier.

Since his resignation from the Queensland Parliament in 2001, Mr Borbidge has held a number of Board positions in both private and publicly listed companies.

He is Chairman of Australia Treasury Management, Careflight Group, Cedar Creek Cellars, the Embracing 2018 Advisory Committee for the Commonwealth Games, the Executive Task Force for the Institute of Glycomics at Griffith University, Study Gold Coast, and Trinity Health Services.

Mr Borbidge is a member of the Council of Griffith University and a trustee of the Friends of Griffith University Foundation.

In 2006 he was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia and made an Honorary Doctor of Griffith University.



The Honourable Dr Anthony Lynham

The Honourable Dr Anthony Lynham is the Minister for State Development and Minister for Natural Resources and Mines.

Before entering Parliament as the Member for the Brisbane seat of Stafford in 2014, Dr Lynham worked as a maxillofacial surgeon. As a surgeon who continuously dealt with the aftermath of violence, before entering Parliament, Dr Lynham was a prominent advocate of policies to minimise alcoholfuelled violence.

Upon his election in July 2014, he served as the Shadow Minister for Education, Innovation, Science and Information Technology, Shadow Minister for Primary Industries and Fisheries, and shadow spokesman for the public service assisting the leader.

Dr Lynham graduated in medicine from the University of Newcastle and completed his maxillofacial surgery training in Queensland. He is a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh. Dr Lynham worked most of his medical career at the Royal Brisbane and Women's hospital and is part of a research team at Prince Charles Hospital. He also served in the Australian Army.

Dr Lynham is an Adjunct Professor at OUT and an Associate Professor at the University of Queensland (UQ) School of Medicine.

From the Chairman



It has been such an honour to have been on the Board of Life Education Queensland since its formation in 1987, and to now have the opportunity to serve as Chairman.

During those early years, I recall how our organisation was shaped by the energy, drive and passion of Life Education's founder, Ted Noffs, and his vision of a safe and healthy life for all children. Ted was a great Australian whose outreach to young people at the Wayside Crisis Centre in Kings Cross in the '60s and '70s was an inspiration for those who followed in his footsteps. Most importantly, Ted recognised and responded to the growing threat of drug and alcohol abuse among young Australians long before many people realised the extent of the problem. In a similar way, Ted founded Life Education in advance of health and drug education being included into the school curriculum. It was Ted's very personal experience of working with young people that led to his unique understanding of the need for a national preventative education

program. Consequently, Life Education commenced in NSW in 1979, and barely seven years later our Queensland headquarters at Broadbeach was under construction.

Fast forward to 2015, and the fruits of Ted's legacy are clearly evident in the 1.2 million Queenslanders, mostly now adults, who have benefited from the Life Education program in the past 29 years. In 2015 alone, 180,000 children and young people were beneficiaries of our work, which is amazing considering that barely two years ago our program reached only 107,000 children.

This growth is largely thanks to the continued support from the State Government through Queensland Health. This partnership, along with the support of thousands of Life Education donors, is enabling us to service the remotest areas of the State, and has resulted in more than 100 additional schools accessing our program over the past 12 months.

However, there is still much work to be done to address those issues that remain a significant threat to the future health and wellbeing of our children. Growing rates of obesity, related to poor diet and lack of exercise, represents one of our nation's greatest health challenges. Work is also needed to help change our alcohol culture and combat the sickening violence that is often associated with binge drinking. And whilst it is pleasing to see so many young people continuing to turn away

from cigarette smoking, there are still communities in Queensland where smoking rates remain stubbornly high in comparison with the rest of the State, and the overall health impact from smoking continues to be an enormous burden on our health system.

Much has been made in the media over the past year about the problem of illegal drugs, and in particular the devastating effects associated with the drug Ice. It's a significant challenge, and Life Education is committed to expanding our program in 2016 to incorporate a greater focus on education to secondary students on the dangers of alcohol and illegal drugs.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our CEO, staff and volunteers for faithfully continuing Ted Noffs' vision, and for ensuring that the program we deliver today is as relevant to the needs of schools, teachers and young people as it was in Ted's time.

On behalf of the Board, I would also like to thank the Queensland Government, and all of our donors and community and corporate partners, for your important investment in our future generation of young Queenslanders. Your partnership throughout 2016 will be vital as we continue to support our young people to make safer and healthier choices.

From the CEO

To paraphrase the words of Edmund Burke, evil flourishes when good people do nothing. I'm fortunate to work in a non-profit organisation where there is no shortage of good people. From our Board, staff and volunteers, to our supporters and donors, we are united in what is arguably one of Queensland's most important causes - the health and safety of our kids.

It is a reality that our children are growing up in a world where not every influence is a positive one. We live in a consumer society where parents and children are constantly marketed to in increasingly sophisticated ways, and where mobile technology makes us a moving target. As parents struggle to keep up with the pace of technological change, and we face an avalanche of information and communication, it is so important that there are credible sources of information that parents and children can rely upon. Equally, it is vital that children develop the skills to recognise how to navigate a world that offers unprecedented opportunity and choice. The capacity to make informed and healthy choices at an early age can greatly influence the choices a person will make later in life.

What I love about Life Education is that it is inherently such a wonderfully engaging and positive program, and one of the influences in a child's life that is often fondly remembered, even cherished. No matter what negative

influences may be occurring in a child's life, participation in the Life Education program is always a good and beneficial experience for a child. I hear this from the many children who respond to our surveys, or who take the time to draw pictures or write letters to us, from the thousands of teachers that we work with each year, and from parents who share with us their child's excitement when they come home from school. Increasingly, I also hear this from adults, those in their 20s and 30s from all walks of life, who excitedly recount their Life Education experience, and of course their encounters with Healthy

It is exciting that a growing number of adults who have experienced our work as children are now regular donors, through our Hands Up Now! program. This idea of giving back is a wonderful way that Queenslanders are able to help create a legacy that is now assisting a new generation of young people to benefit from our program. You'll find more information on our Hands Up Now! regular giving program in this annual report.

As we seek to build our long-term sustainability through fundraising programs like Hands Up Now!, the support of both Government and Business is essential. Our partnership with Queensland Health in particular has enabled an additional 73,000 children and young people to access

our program, compared to two years ago. This growth of almost 70% in our reach is quite extraordinary and exciting, but now has to be maintained. This is costly. Queensland is a vast State and Life Education now has a fleet of 19 Mobile Learning Centres, many of them travelling vast distances. For the first time in our history, communities in areas such as Charleville and Cunnamulla were able to access our program in 2015, and it has been energising for our Educators to see how children in these communities have responded with such excitement.

The support of the Queensland Government has also enabled the establishment of a new Sexual Health and Relationships program called Talk About It, which has been enthusiastically received by growing numbers of Queensland schools. We now have a team of specialist Educators focusing on this important area of the health curriculum.

So we must work together to build on the success we have achieved in recent years, so that the Life Education program remains a service that all Queensland communities can have access to, and benefit from - not just for the sake of this generation of young people, but for generations to come.

About Life Education

Life Education is a health promotion charity and Australia's largest independent provider of health and drug education in schools.

Our founder, Ted Noffs, through his work at the Wayside Crisis Centre in Kings Cross in Sydney, devoted much of his life to alleviating the problem of drug and alcohol misuse among young people. His first-hand experience of seeing increasing numbers of young Australians in need of drug and alcohol rehabilitation led him to realise that a greater focus was needed on prevention through health education.

Over the past 36 years, more than 5 million Australians have experienced our annual program, with more than 600,000 children from preschool through to high school taking part each year. Healthy Harold the giraffe, our much loved mascot, helps to deliver our message effectively.

Today Life Education delivers high quality health education programs in a fun learning style with age appropriate material covering topics that range from the importance of making healthy food choices and the benefits of exercise, to the dangers of cigarettes and alcohol.

Recent initiatives include bCyberwise, which was launched nationally in 2013 to help children stay safe online, and Talk About It, which was introduced in Queensland in 2014 to teach children about puberty, relationships and identity.

Life Education Queensland is an affiliate of Life Education Australia. We deliver our program to more than 180,000 Queensland children in partnership with over 600 schools and 147 preschools every year, through a team of specialist health Educators.

Our approach to education is innovative and engaging. We use a combination of specialist Educators, customised Mobile Learning Centres, and a range of student and teacher resources.

We have a vision to see generations of healthy young Australians living to their full potential. So the sessions are designed to motivate, encourage and empower children to exercise informed, healthy lifestyle choices. We achieve this by providing children with:

- age appropriate health knowledge
- skills and strategies to counter peer and social
- an understanding of how values and attitudes can influence lifestyle choices and behaviour.

From the early years to secondary school, the Life Education program is highly relevant to the needs of children as they make everyday choices that can impact their health and wellbeing.

Talk About It - Sexual Health and Relationships

Talk About It is Life Education Queensland's new Sexual Health and Relationships program, launched in the latter half of 2014.

This innovative program is funded through a partnership with Queensland Health and focuses on young people in upper primary and secondary schools.

Talk About It is delivered by Life Education's specialist sexual health Educators in the classroom and is structured in up to three 90 minute modules for each year from Years 5 to 10.

The program is designed to support schools to implement this important facet of the Australian Health & Physical Education curriculum.

Expansion of the program this year has seen it reach more than 18,000 students from Years 5 – 10.

The content has been structured to fit within a holistic model encompassing physical, social and emotional health and is broadly organised in three modules:

- 1. Identity
- 2. Reproductive health
- 3. Relationships

There has been particular demand for the Reproductive Health module, especially Puberty, for Years 5 and 6. Increasing interest in the cyber safety component of relationships has also been seen. The secondary program now incorporates sessions for large groups, that are tailored to meet the needs of the individual schools.

This year a full time Sexual Health & Relationships Education Manager was appointed, along with a Townsville based Educator to deliver the program to North Queensland.

With a worrying increase in Sexually Transmissible Infections (STIs) among young Queenslanders, Life Education sees this program as an important investment in empowering young people to make informed and safer choices to avoid these diseases.

Northern Queensland Primary Health Network partnership

North Queensland secondary school students can now access vital drug and alcohol education thanks to Life Education's partnership with the Northern Queensland Primary Health Network (PHN).

For almost 30 years, Life Education has been delivering health education to primary school students in Queensland. This year, in response to growing community concern regarding binge drinking, Ice and other illicit drug use, we have expanded our focus to provide curriculum aligned drug education to high school students.

Face the Facts is Life Education's secondary school program, with an emphasis on legal and illegal drugs. It aims to empower young people with the knowledge and the skills to make safe and informed choices.

Northern Queensland PHN contributed \$35,000 towards the costs associated with the delivery of the Face the Facts program, and provided a vehicle for Life Education's specialist Educator to visit each of the schools in the region.

We now have a specialist Educator, Vicki Bombardieri, based in Townsville who works with secondary schools across North Queensland, from Mackay to the far North.

"It is so important to provide young people with the right information so they can make informed choices. Education is a key strategy to combatting the drug and alcohol issues in our community. Northern Beaches State High School is so pleased that our students have this opportunity thanks to Life Education and Northern Queensland PHN."

Expanding our reach in Queensland

Two new Life Education Mobile Learning Centres (vans) commenced in Term 4 delivering health education to the North West and South West of the State, expanding our reach in regional Queensland.

NORTH WEST QUEENSLAND

North West Educator Simone Parkes delivered the Life Education program to students in Emerald, then further West to Barcaldine and Longreach, up to Cloncurry and Mount Isa, then on to Julia Creek, Richmond, Pentland and Homestead.

The Mount Isa community now has access to Life Education programs again for the first time in 13 years!

"The funding from Queensland Health has been instrumental in our expansion of services to schools across regional Queensland including Mount Isa," says Michael Fawsitt, CEO of Life Education Queensland.

SOUTH WEST QUEENSLAND

South West Educator Claire Johnson delivered the Life Education program to students in Roma for the first time ever!

LOGAN/IPSWICH REGION

An additional van to service the Logan/Ipswich region commenced in Term 3.

Goodna State School was the first school in Ipswich to welcome the brand new van built with funds provided by the Queensland Government. Bundamba MP Jo-Ann Miller was there to officially launch it, along with Life Education Queensland CEO, Michael Fawsitt.

The occasion also marked an important milestone in Life Education's delivery of drug and health education to children in Ipswich. Thanks to Government support, over the past twelve months the charity has empowered more than 11,000 Ipswich children with knowledge and skills to help them make safer, healthier choices.

This is the first time that Life Education has reached more than 10,000 students in Ipswich over a 12 month period.



Our Impact

In 2015, Life Education received feedback through our evaluation survey from 5,269 Queensland teachers.

This is an important tool to measure our effectiveness, helping us to ensure that our program meets the needs of our school partners. The results from the respondents were compelling:

- 98% rated the program as a 'good' or 'excellent' resource to support teachers
- 99% said there was a **need in their community** for Life Education programs
- 98% 'agreed' or 'strongly agreed' that the Life Education curriculum resources were valuable



Queensland Regional Committees

BUNDABERG

Life Education Bundaberg delivered the program to 7,691 children and 54 schools in the region this year.

CENTRAL QUEENSLAND

Life Education Central Queensland operated four days per week and was fully booked for 2015.

Forty schools were serviced and a total of 7,600 primary school and 300 Early Childhood children experienced one of the Life Education programs. Our Educator Liz Hills received excellent feedback from schools, some having their first visit in seven years.

Paige Martinez has completed training to work as our Early Childhood Educator in childcare centres across the Rockhampton and Capricorn Coast regions and will commence part time in 2016.

The Life Education Central Queensland committee remains small but prides itself that all members are genuine volunteers. Our longest shift of the mobile classroom from Rockhampton to Moranbah and back involves over 1,000 kilometres of travel – all done with voluntary drivers!

We have completed the year within budget and without the need for any major maintenance. Special thanks for our sound financial position must go to the Queensland Government for its support, our major sponsor Wesfarmers Resources who covered costs for Blackwater and Woorabinda State School visits and the Educator's vehicle, Rockhampton Regional Council who helped with an upgrade of the committee's computer and software package, and local business Mitcon Projects for sponsoring visits to two low socio-economic schools: Lakes Creek and Berserker Street.

COOLOOLA NOOSA

2015 was another successful year for Life Education Cooloola Noosa delivering the program to 7,125 students in the region. For more than five years, Educator Niki Andrinopoulos has visited at least 22 schools each year and has formed significant, lasting relationships with teachers and students at each school. We have a dedicated committee of five volunteers who fundraise, manage and support Niki in her teaching role.

We were particularly pleased to deliver the Life Education program to Tin Can Bay State School. This school is important as it is in an area in need of services like Life Education. However, due to the distance from major centres, the students often miss out on valuable extra-curricular classes as very few providers will travel to the area.

Our sponsor Bendigo Bank continued its generous support of our programs across the Noosa and Gympie Shires.

TOOWOOMBA

Life Education Toowoomba delivered the program to 7,021 children this year, with 363 of these participating in the additional free *On the Case* tobacco education module, thanks to support from Queensland Health.

Our secretary Jane Tait has retired after several years of dedicated service. We are pleased to welcome Robyn Ayles to the position. She brings valuable experience from volunteering in education-related roles for many years.

We manned the gate of Val & Ron Peachey's exhibition garden during Toowoomba's Annual Carnival of Flowers.

Life Education Toowoomba volunteers collected more than \$11,000 – our best year yet! We were well supported by Rotary, Zonta and the National Seniors clubs with this project.

TOWNSVILLE

Life Education Townsville visited 39 schools in the region and 11,164 students participated in the program. Of these, 1,077 Year 6 students participated in the additional free *On the Case* tobacco education module, thanks to support from Queensland Health.

Our Educator Tim McKean headed South to deliver the Life Education program to schools in the Burdekin area. Next year, these schools will be covered by the new North West mobile classroom allowing Tim to focus on Townsville. Tim delivered the program to a number of Early Learning Centres over the year and we plan to deliver the program to even more next year.

The committee continues to conduct regular Charity Raffles at the Cowboys Leagues Club.

Our community partnership also continues with BM Webb, generously providing a truck and driver to relocate our mobile classroom when required. The company also stored the mobile classroom safely undercover for the Christmas break. Thank you once again BM Webb!

The demand for the program in Townsville remains strong and feedback from schools is very positive, with many advising that Tim is a very enthusiastic Educator, interacts well with staff and students, and is a delight to work with.

The Management Committee

OUEENSLANDERS PUT THEIR HANDS UP TO SUPPORT LIFE EDUCATION

Hands Up Now! is a rapidly growing community of Life Education supporters who share a common goal to empower Aussie kids to live a safer and healthier life.

Since the program was launched in October 2014, this community has grown to over 5,000 active donors, who provide a monthly regular gift (which is tax deductible), to support the work of Life Education.

Founded by Life Education Queensland CEO Michael Fawsitt as a Queensland program, there are plans to expand Hands Up Now! into other States in the coming years.

"There are approximately five million Australians, including over a million Queenslanders, who have participated in the Life Education program as children," says Michael. "And many parents also know of our program from the information that their children share with them. It's therefore no surprise that more than half of our Hands Up Now! supporters have already experienced our program in the past, and are now helping us to reach many more young people with vital drug and health education. Hands Up Now! supporters share our concerns for the issues facing young Australians, and want to invest in a positive program that empowers kids to make healthier and safer choices."

Funds raised from Hands Up Now! supporters in Queensland are directed towards our work across the State. For example:



- \$49 / month can help deliver health and drug education to a small regional school for one year.
- \$37 / month could provide education and resources to help keep one disadvantaged child safe from harm every week.
- \$20 / month can empower 25 children to make safer, healthier choices every year. That's equivalent to a classroom of children.

Hands Up Now! supporters also receive regular updates on the difference their support is making, including letters and feedback from the children who are benefiting from our program.
